
Staynor Hall RSE consultation - Parent Responses

- 84% of parents said that they are aware of the topics that will be taught in RSE at Staynor Hall Community Primary Academy.









Our response

As a result of the feedback from the parent/carer consultation it has been decided that prior to a new unit of learning being taught an overview of PSHE will be shared with parents. This will be shared on the weekly newsletter.

The information will outline the overall topic, the learning intention for each week for each year group and the key vocabulary that will be used for each of these lessons.

This overview also contains some resources that will be helpful for you as parents/carers to support your child's learning at home.

Here is an example of what this looks like:



A boy of 7 years old doesn't need to know what a vulva is.

All RSE lessons will be taught to both boys and girls. It is important for the children to grow up with an understanding of what each gender may be experiencing.

As a result of the parent/carer consultation it has been decided that children in Year 2 will be taught the scientific names for external private parts. The impact of this is to ensure children, who may have a problem or concern regarding their private parts, are equipped with the tools to be able to talk about this appropriately and ask for help.

I don't agree with teaching year 2 children about types of genders. It isn't necessary to know these details in order for children to know how to be respectful.

In the Year 2 gender diversity topic the children will learn about the stereotypes associated with different genders e.g. Girls like pink and boys like blue. They will also discuss and develop a respectful understanding that children can be individual and do not need to fit into a specific model, some children may like both pink and wearing boys clothes. Children will be taught the importance of being accepting of everyone, even if they are different to you.

I think it should be taught in higher Pupil voice, alongside other key stakeholders such as years only, allowing children to be staff, governors and parents, have informed our RSE children as long as possible. curriculum by holding a parent/carer focus group.
